

Q: What inspired you to become a poetry writer?



STC ASCENDER Girls Discovering Math Club Organization Fundraising for Yaqui Animal Rescue

RIO GRANDE CITY, TEXAS- On Friday, April 6, 2024, the Girls Discovering Math Club dropped off their first donations to the Yaqui Animal Rescue in Sullivan City, Texas.

The Club was first formed in Spring of 2023 to support and inspire minority women's interest in the STEM fields by promoting STEM associate degrees, creating a community where students can socialize, share interests, and support each other to meet their educational goals.

At the start of the Spring 2024 semester the club, with the sponsorship of Catch the Next ASCENDER and under the guidance of Advisors Rosa Gutierrez and Lazaro Garcia Costilla, decided to start fundraising efforts in support of the Yaqui Animal Rescue. The Rescue has a complex and long history, but it wasn't until 2004 when Sonia Venecia repurchased her family's old ranch to make it into a rescue, that the organization started taking shape to what it is today.

Nine years later, in 2013 through hard work and an extraordinary amount of passion for animals the Yaqui Animal Rescue officially became a registered no-kill/non-profit organization with a rescue team that has saved thousands of strays (Yaqui Animal Rescue, 2024). With knowledge of what the rescue stands for the Girls Discovering Math Club found it the best fit for them to turn their fundraising efforts towards.



On February 1st the Club had started collecting various donations from pet bowls, dog and cat food, kitty litter, puppy pads, bleach, Dawn dish soap, detergent, cleaning supplies etc. to drop off at the end of March 31st. Then on April 6, after collecting all the supplies that were donated The club set out to Sullivan City to make the drop off and learn a bit more about the Animal Rescue by touring the grounds and most importantly meeting all the pet beneficiaries.



One of the first stops the club made was at the Cat Barn, which currently houses 60 cats. In addition to the cat barn there was also a separate quarantined unit for the cats who were ill and had leukemia and other afflictions, which require extra attention. Afterwards the group was shown the Rescue pigs. There were around 10 pigs give or take that had been rescued from slaughter or given up by local farmers. The rescue Dogs were up next with the Rescue having over 60 dogs of various ages. Some of whom had been there for over 13 years. In addition to the dog sanctuary there was also a separate air conditioned unit for more elderly dogs to get some peace and enjoy their later days. The following stop for the Club was visiting the equines on the property. Their were three adult horses, one mule, and a pony. The final animal the Club visited was the literal black sheep of the bunch Tomasa.

Being able to experience how much effort and work goes into helping save and help animals was a rewarding experience for the Girls Discovering Math Club and they can't wait to help out again. The Club will continue spreading the word and supporting the Yaqui Animal Rescue with the intent to continue facilitating and maintaining a good relationship with the organization. In addition, to supporting the Rescue The Club also wishes to set their sights on other ways to help and set their mark on the community.

As an organization, Catch the Next has steadfastly believed that our community is a treasure trove of knowledge, innovation, and reflective practice. This journal was created as a space to share best practices, innovative teaching strategies, and ideas for supporting the students we serve. As such, we are interested in pieces that consider the following questions:

- What classroom-level reforms has my college enacted in the last 5 years? How have I responded to them?
- What reforms have changed the delivery format of my classes (e.g., combining or condensing course sequences, reducing the number of course offerings, moving content into labs or online modules)?
- What professional development was I provided or did I participate in to adapt to changing policy?
- What has been successful for me in adapting to change? On the flip side, what has not worked?
- Who are my students and how have their needs changed in the last 5 years? How am I responding to those changes?

Pieces that consider other questions are welcome as well.

When possible, we encourage collaborations in the writing process. Faculty members may consult with their Institutional Research and Effectiveness partners to provide anonymized data to provide some deeper context about the effectiveness of a policy. For faculty who are working with a learning community or paired course setup, we invite both faculty to present their perspectives. We also invite college teams (e.g., departments, college teams involved in implementing the Ascender model, and so forth).

We also welcome doctoral students and scholars who are interested in research on the community college sector and student success initiatives in Texas as they relate to gateway courses (e.g., developmental education,

Freshman Composition, Learning Frameworks, and College Algebra). **Mentoring in the Writing Process is Available!** For first-time authors, writing for publication can be a daunting experience. NSF Offers Funding Opportunities to HSIs

The National Science Foundation is offering funding to HSIs for three projects:

- Planning or Pilot Projects (PPP) track: An eligible institution cannot have more than two active PPP awards. A new PPP proposal can be submitted by an institution with two active PPP awards if at least one of the awards has had its final report submitted before the submission deadline for HSI proposals. Institutions with an active HSI Track 1: Building Capacity award under the previous solicitations 18-524 and 19-540 are not eligible to submit PPP proposals or receive a PPP award until the prior HSI award's final report is submitted.
- Implementation and Evaluation Projects (IEP) track: An eligible institution cannot have more than two active IEP awards. A new IEP proposal can be submitted by an institution with two active IEP awards if at least one of the awards has had its final report submitted prior to the HSI proposal submission deadline. A collaborative award counts as an HSI IEP award for all institutions. For institutions with a current Track 1: Building Capacity award under the previous solicitations 18-524 and 19-540, each award is considered an IEP award for the purpose of calculating active awards for this track.
- Institutional Transformation Projects (ITP) track: One submission per institution is allowed. Previous ITP awardees are not eligible to submit a proposal in the ITP track.




